Manitoba Net Exports Remain Narrow

Bottom Line


Canada's domestic exports are about 3 per cent below last February, and imports are down 4 per cent according to Statistics Canadas trade data released in August 2020.

Manitoba's domestic exports are up about 6 per cent above February 2020 attributable to stronger trade in farm, fishing and food products and consumer goods. Imports in the Province are still about 6 per cent below the February level. This is due to continuing weakness in aircraft and transportation equipment, chemicals, and mining and associated products.

The weakness in the use of passenger aircraft GDP for Manitoba continues to weigh on the upstream aircraft and parts industry. While GDP numbers in <u>WED #34</u> reveals a continued weakness for bus manufacturing, the investments made clear by the federal Speech from the Throne should add support to this supply chain after orders are in the pipeline.

Trade – All Merchandise and Destinations

Figure 1: Canada Trade (\$Billions)





Canada's August 2020 trade was flat to slightly recovering over July numbers. Canada's domestic exports rose to \$39.7 billion, about 3 per cent below their pre-lockdown level in February 2020 (**Figure 1**).

Canada's imports were flat at \$46.7 billion. This is 4 per cent above their pre-lockdown level in February 2020. Net exports for Canada are -\$7 billion.



Figure 2: Manitoba's Trade (\$Billions)





Manitoba, domestic exports in August 2020 were \$1.36 billion, up slightly month-over-month and up 6 per cent over February 2020 (**Figure 2**).

Manitoba's imports in August were \$1.64 billion, continuing to rise month-over-month. August imports are still 6 per cent below February.

Manitoba's net exports have remained narrow post-lockdown, at -\$274 million in August (**Figure 3**).

Trade by Product

Support for Manitoba's domestic exports has primarily come from two of the largest product export categories (**Table 1**):

- farm, fishing, and intermediate food products (index of 117),
- Consumer goods (index of 110).

Domestic export weakness came from Aircraft and parts (index of 69), motor vehicles and parts (index of 82), chemicals (index of 85), and industrial machinery (index of

Manitoba's imports were strengthened by imports of energy products (index of 137). Weakness originated from a sharp reduction in imports of aircraft and transportation equipment (index of 41), chemicals (index of 78), and mining and products (index of 81).
