REAL GDP FOR 2020

MANITOBA'S CHANGE IN RGDP WAS IN THE MIDDLE OF CANADA'S THIRTEEN PROVINCES AND TERRITORIES.


Bottom Line

Statistics Canada released their 2020 annual <u>GDP estimates by province/territory</u> and industry on Monday May 3, 2021. The dominant factor in these estimates was the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Canadian economy.

Every province saw a decline in real GDP compared to 2019, with only the Yukon and Nunavut seeing an increase in real GDP. Manitoba's decline (-4.8%) was lower than the Canadian average decline of 5.3 per cent. Overall declines in real GDP depended upon industrial structure and how the COVID-19 pandemic evolved in the province/territory.

Manitoba Real GDP (\$Billions)

In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic was the main factor in the -4.8 per cent decline of Manitoba's real GDP to \$60.2 billion. This was down from \$63.3 billion in 2019.

Real GDP Growth (Decline) by Province/Teritory in 2020 (Y/Y % Change)

Manitoba's real GDP decline of 4.8 per cent was right in the middle of the provinces and territories.

The largest declines on a percentage basis were found in:

- the Northwest Territories (-10.4%), and
- Alberta (-8.2%).

The only two increases in 2020 were in:

- the Yukon (+1.1%), and
- Nunavut (+3.5%).

Manitoba Real GDP Share by Sector, 2020 (%)

When we examine Manitoba's \$60.2 billion of real GDP distribution by industry, we see an identical high-level split to our 2019 results. Considering the above tree map, which represents Manitoba's real GDP distribution, we see a split into:

- · Goods production (29 per cent),
- · Commercial services (48.2 per cent), and
- non-commercial services (22.8 per cent).


The difference in 2020 over 2019 is due to changes at the sector level.

With some slippage for manufacturing, and gains for owner-occupied dwellings, these two categories switched places as the top two categories from Manitoba 2019 results.

Manitoba Real GDP Share by Sector, 2020 (%)

As we can see from the above, and two following charts, the industry sectorsthat gained on the year were:

- Utilities (+5%),
- Agriculture and forestry (+5%),
- financial and insurance (+4%),
- owner-occupied dwellings (+2%), and
- wholesale (+2%).


Most other sectors lost ground. The largest declines were found in the following sectors:

- Mining, oil and gas (-18%),
- Accommodation, Food, Arts, Entertainment, Info and culture (-16%),
- Transportation and Warehousing (-15%),
- Admin, Management of Companies and Other Services (-12%), and
- Construction (-11%).


